Just as I would turn into our street as a child and see the tree lights guiding me home, how true it is now – that Jesus is the Light who guides us all. And in the same way on Christmas day as a family we would gather around the tree, how God gathers us into His family through Jesus. Christmas is still my favourite time of the year because of what the tree reminds me of. I pray that as you see various trees this year or as you put up and decorate your own tree, you too would be reminded of these truths.

#### **Tribute to Alex Steel - A life serving God**

Samuel Alexander Steel (Alex) was born on the 16<sup>th</sup> October 1943 in Glasgow. Following the birth of his sister Jean and brother Gordon, the family moved to Millerston where Alex lived until moving to Northern Ireland to marry Joan.

Growing up Alex attended Millerston United Free Church. In May 1962 at the age of 18, he was ordained as a Deacon. In Millerston Church Alex had put his trust in God and he very much wanted to live his life for God and serve Him. But as he would often tell us he didn't want to draw attention to himself, it was all about doing God's work quietly. He lived very much by this verse - Galatians 6:14 "But God forbid that I should glory, save in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by whom the world is crucified unto me, and I unto the world."

Alex and Joan settled in Great Victoria Street Presbyterian where in 1972 Alex was ordained and installed as an elder. In his role as an elder Alex served as Property Convener, overseeing the refurbishment of Great Victoria Street when they turned the pews and pulpit through 90 degrees – a vision for church architecture ahead of its time. Alex and Joan were blessed with a daughter Jacquelyn, son-in-law Paul and grandchildren Calum and Imogen – all of whom Alex held in his heart with great pride.

When Alex and Joan moved to Newtownards they settled in Streaan and on 28<sup>th</sup> September 2003 Alex was installed as elder. Alex served faithfully as an elder, also taking on other roles including serving as Church Secretary, Clerk of Session, editor of the church magazine and website, leader of a small group and a member of the choir.

After a short illness in recent months Alex was called home to be with his Lord on Friday 4<sup>th</sup> October 2019. As his church family we know that Alex's Scottish heritage and resilience as well as his strong faith remained solid throughout his life. As his minister I am thankful to have known Alex – and to have seen the many people that he guided, encouraged and supported.

## **CHRISTMAS AT STREAN**

When we think about Christmas at Strean there are a number of images that come to mind.

### ***Bearing Gifts***

Our Christmas Tree service on the first Sunday in December. At this, the toys and gifts that our children and families donate are brought forward and go to Belfast City Mission – from there they are distributed to children and families in need, who would otherwise struggle to provide a present on Christmas morning. This connection has been in place over 50 years. And over the last 10 years or so we have participated in the Blythwood Shoebox Appeal – sending nearly 1,000 shoeboxes over this timescale to children and adults in Eastern Europe. Giving gifts reminds us of the Wise Men, who brought gifts from afar to mark the Christ child's coming.



### ***Bringing light***

Our Christmas tree is selected and collected each year by Ross Workman from Jim Noble on the Donaghadee Road. On asking a number of our longer established members the conclusion is that this tradition – of putting up a large Christmas tree in our church sanctuary each December – started in the early to mid-1960s. The tradition of the Christmas tree originated in Germany in the 16<sup>th</sup> Century, when trees were brought into homes to be decorated. The Christmas tree then became popular in England in 1841 when Queen Victoria's husband, Prince Albert, brought a Christmas tree over from Germany and put it in Windsor Castle. In Strean the tree is put up and decorated each year by our BB and GB officers and young people. The lights and decorations serve to symbolise Christ's light in the world, and the evergreen foliage shows everlasting life.



### ***The Story of Christmas***

Again traditionally in Strean, like many other churches, we celebrate the story of Christmas on the Sunday before Christmas Day. Known as a Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols, the use of song and Bible readings serves to tell us the story of Christ coming to earth – from the proclamation of the angel, through to the journey to Bethlehem, the birth of Christ,

the arrival of the wise men, the shepherds in the fields - a story of great rejoicing.

Up until very recent years two planks of wood were placed in the middle of the church, candles placed on top and lit. With the coming of 'health & safety', and recognising the potential fire hazard, our lighting arrangement has changed – with candles housed within lanterns and fairy lights providing the sparkle and effect. And the symbol – of Christ being the Light of the World – remains.

## The Meaning of Christmas

For many of us looking back at Christmas past reminds us of a long stocking left at the end of the bed. Of the delight of finding an apple and an orange and hopefully some money in this the next morning. As we step through the decades, others remember flicking through the catalogue pages, in an era before the internet. Others remember their Mother or Father visiting a local store in the run-up to Christmas – putting an amount of money on a particular toy or bicycle each week – in order to secure it for the big day. With this in mind we asked our some of our young people – in Sunday School and Youth Fellowship – what Christmas means to them. This is what they said:

## REFLECTIONS OF MY TRIP TO UGANDA SEPTEMBER 2019

*What prompted you to be interested in going on a mission trip with Abaana?*

I knew this was something I wanted to do from a young age, when I was in primary 7, I went along to a mission meeting in Streaton and instantly I knew God had plans for me. Growing up I always wanted to be a missionary but I never knew what that truly looked like for me.

When a married couple from Thriving Life Church (TLC) announced that they were going over to Uganda in 2019, and they were looking for a team to join them, I realised I was ready to take the step. The decision to go to Uganda was because that is where Abaana work from and TLC had fundraised a year or two prior to the trip, to build a primary school in a village called Gulu.



*What were the requirements placed on you to be part of the team?*

There was a financial commitment involved. I had to raise £1,700, a substantial amount of this was raised through the generosity of the people in Streaton. It was also important to be aware of how challenging and intense the trip would be at times.

*What were the main objectives once you arrived in Uganda? .*

When we arrived we spent our first week in Kampala, the capital city and we stayed in the Abaana guest house. In our first week we spent time with the street children. These are children who live on the streets and have absolutely nothing. They have either left home or their parents have left them. We got to give them food and teach them some children's songs in English and they absolutely loved it. Then towards the end of the first week we went to the *New Life Homes* which is a place where some street children get to go and live to have a better chance at life. People sponsor these children and that money gets to put them through school

and it also pays for their basic needs. The second week we travelled 6 hours North to Gulu where we stayed in a hotel and spent each day at the Primary school that was built by TLC. This was a very different experience to Kampala as the children were a little scared of us and we were used to being greeted by children running towards us, were as these children were almost running away, although by the end of the week they were very upset to see us leave. We got to play games and teach them some English which was a great experience and took everybody out of their comfort zones.



*What impact has the trip had on you and what impact did the work have on the community you were placed in?*

This trip has completely changed my life. I have seen things that completely broke me but made me realise how privileged and blessed I am. The community were so grateful and said we had a huge impact on them. They learnt new things and they got to experience life in a completely different way. Some of the new life homes boys cried when we left and that just speaks for itself.



*Is there any advice that you would give to someone who was considering doing something similar?*

I would tell absolutely everybody to do it if they get the chance to!!! Advice I would give to anybody going to do something similar would be to just go and enjoy it. Make the most of it. Be prepared for some of the hardest goodbyes you will ever have to say. And yes, I would definitely do it again.

## STEPHEN WILSON

### Cycle CR2 from Whitehaven to Newcastle - 21-23 September 2019



#### What is it and why do it?

1 Corinthians 6:19-20 *“Do you not know that your bodies are temples of the Holy Spirit, who is in you, whom you have received from God? You are not your own; you were bought at a price. Therefore honour God with your bodies.”*

C2C is one of the UK's best known cycle routes. It's 145 miles with 4,000 metres of ups and downs and a popular challenge for cyclists. I have long wanted to follow the route and decided this was the year to do it. I used the opportunity to support Marie Curie. Many thanks to everyone who helped raise £1,000.

#### How long did it take?

Many cycle the route in two days or even a single day. They are a lot fitter than I am. My plan was to fly to Newcastle, catch a train to Whitehaven, renting a bicycle, get luggage panniers packed and be ready to go Saturday morning. My Saturday target was cycling 55 miles across the Lake District to Penrith. Sunday's target was 45 miles from Penrith over the highest point to the Cross Keys Inn just outside Stanhope. Monday was 46 miles, a stiff climb out Stanhope and a final push to drop the bike off at the Rock of Gibraltar Inn, Tynemouth.

#### How did it go?

*Philippians 4:13 “I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me.”*



Plenty of long steep hills! The route started at a slipway in Whitehaven where I dipped my back wheel in the Irish sea. I was soon cycling on old railway lines (converted to cycle paths) towards the marquee climb of the Lake District, Whinlatter Pass. I quickly learned that this was



not going to be easy and a bit like life there is always another hill to climb! Saturday was fantastic sunshine and a headwind was like cycling towards a hair dryer. At Penrith, after a long day going up hills, there was a climb up several flights of stairs to my teeny room on the top floor of the B&B. Sunday was wet and cold, I now

know about rain like stair-rods. I was frozen climbing Hartside Pass, the longest climb, and no café at top, it burned down last year. In the afternoon the rain continued. I crossed the highest point, 620m, just outside Nenthead. It is open moorland as far as you can see and low flying grouse are a hazard. When the occasional car passed it was quite disheartening to watch it zig zag upwards, past snow poles lining the road, towards the horizon. I was so glad to discover my room for the night in Cross Keys, had a bath and it served fantastic roast dinner!



The last day, Monday, started with the very steep Crawleyside Bank. I passed 2 defibrillators but thankfully didn't need them! The weather was good for cycling and I really enjoyed a downhill stretch on the Waskerly way before following the river Tyne to the finish in Tynemouth. Sadly there is no slipway at Tynemouth so dipping the front wheel in the North Sea was not possible.

### What were the highlights?

Reaching the highest point and knowing the worst section was over.

Thank you again to supporters who together gave £1000 for Marie Curie.
